Highland Beach couple name center at Place of Hope

Visitors to the Place of Hope in West Boca won't recognize the old recreation hall, the latest transformation on the former The Haven campus now dotted with cottage-style accommodations for children eligible for foster care or who have aged out of the system.

The building still stands. But what was one big empty room is now The Jeannine and Leland Morris Art, Education and Wellness Center. There's a sleek commercial teaching kitchen, a 500-square-foot gym, a coffee bar, study areas and places to gather inside and out. There's even a patio.

"It's stylish, but functional," Jeannine Morris said, crediting advancement director Lisa McDulin with the concept.

The Highland Beach couple had precedent naming a building on a campus already named for Leighan and David Rinker. It was the next step in their commitment. She's an Angel Mom, a group formed to bring awareness, sponsor events and encourage donations.

"A friend invited me to a luncheon and their mission intrigued me," she said about the Place of Hope's Paxson campus in Palm Beach Gardens. "I was impressed by the team and like

the faith-based concept."

She was also impressed with founding executive director Charles Bender's "vision and enthusiasm."

"There are approximately 1,210 in out-of-home care in Palm Beach County. During 2015, there was an average of 97 removals per month," Bender said in a statement at the ribbon cutting.

"In the beginning we got involved in a very small way," said Leland Morris. "The catalyst for a greater involvement was when they bought this facility," he said about the former The Haven. "We said, 'maybe we could make a difference here."

The Morrises, who have three grown children, liked the idea of cultural enrichment, too. "These kids have nothing and are starting out with three strikes against them. It breaks your heart," he said. "The timing was right and we felt good about it. It's not about us."

The Morrises are also becoming respite foster parents and completed a sixweek training program and home visits.

"We're just finalizing the process for children under 2," Jeannine Morris said.
